## Bootleg Dance Festival Commissions Seven Local Choreographers/Collectives For 2011 New Work Festival March 4th – 6th at Bootleg Theater

The Bootleg Dance Festival is presented by the award-winning Bootleg Theater to use its excellent venue to promote and present the work of seven exciting choreographers from all parts of Los Angeles County. The Bootleg Dance Festival will feature work from a full range of styles, cultures, and approaches that represent contemporary dance in the world today.

Curated by Heidi Duckler (Founder & choreographer of Heidi Duckler Dance Company – formerly Collage Dance Theatre) and Alicia Hoge-Adams (Artistic Director, Bootleg Theater).

"This is Bootleg's first dance festival. The idea came about because our warehouse performance space has unused potential as a formal dance space, and because our side of Los Angeles, the East Side, has unused potential as a center for dance. Many wonderful dancers and choreographers from all over the world live in Los Angeles, and they need more places to create and present their work. ## **Bootleg Dance Festival Schedule:**

Friday, March 4th -

Arianne Hoffmann & A Group of Movers is performing a new work in which bodily expulsions take the shape of a dance. What experiences haunt us? What does it look and sound like if we try to expel them? Spontaneous movement joins a structured approach to dance-making, resulting in a touching and captivating piece.

Keith Glassman presents *Dancing With Ghosts*, a septet performed by an intergenerational cast accompanied by old and new accordion music that uncovers some of the reasons why we are who we are today. What went on back then that we seem to hold on to and why do we grasp it so tightly? Is it possible to resist the pull of the past on our current psyches? Will supernatural events bring us the answers or will the questions remain unsolved for eternity? Performers include Louie Cornejo, Sara Fenton, Klyda Mahoney, Edgar Miramontes, Ken Takemoto and Gloria and Margarita Tinajero, with video by Glassman and Frank Peikert.

Homestretch, choreographed and directed by Carmela Hermann in collaboration with Terrence Luke Johnson, is a non-linear, post-modern soap opera told in movement and words drawn from the last five years of Carmela and Luke's (the two creators) lives. Vignettes of conception, birth, chocolate issues and child rearing to retirement, life-threatening illness and late-life sex are interwoven with movement drawn from dance history, childhood development and the quirkier corners of real life. The piece plays games with identity, time, and continuity.

"SUNOH! Tell me, Sister" grapples with the historical legacy of the courtesans of the Indian subcontinent, bringing to life subversive stories of erotic power and women's resistance. The work is a transnational choreographic collaboration between members of the Post Natyam Collective and is being created over the internet through a long distance, internet-based, creative process.

Antics Performance creates multimedia urban dance performances that transform the traditions of street dance and hip-hop culture into moving visual metaphors. Artistic Director Amy "Catfox" Campion premieres "Illuminated Manuscript" using interactive video projections and structured improvisations that empower the creative talents of exceptional hip hop dancers.

Sunday, March 6<sup>th</sup> -

1<sup>st</sup> Program: Jamie Benson

2<sup>nd</sup> Program: Wife

A dance "dramedy," Jamie Benson and Andrae Gonzalo's *Mass Transit* is a wildly theatrical, 40-minute performance installation directly inspired by real life L.A. metro happenings. Through overlapping vignettes of dance, gesture, noise, and movement, Benson's hybrid-brand of choreography infuses classic and barbaric dance techniques with a vaudevillian performance shtick to create an infectious, off-center, Broadway-style experience. A dynamic evolution of the original workshop, titled *Go Metro* and performed at Highways Performance Space in 2008, *Mass Transit* further observes the human condition by dramatizing public communities and the individual's role within them.

Wife presents *CRONE*: Mystical. Shrewd. Clairvoyant. Sinister. Haggard. Repulsive.

**Arianne Hoffmann** has enjoyed working with a constantly evolving Group of Movers for performances at Movement Research at the Judson Church (NYC) and Highways Performance Space. Currently she employs improvisational strategies and contrasts them with structured elements to create experimental dances. Her diverse works have been presented locally and nationally, and in her native Germany. She holds an MFA in Dance from UCLA.

**Keith Glassman** has made work for the stage, museums, parks, and community centers in New York, New Mexico, Vermont, Maine and throughout California. He is the recipient of a 2007 Lester Horton Award and has presented his dances at Sushi Performance and Visual Art (San Diego), the California Choreographers Festival (Laguna Beach), SOLA, the LA Dance Invitational, the Synergy Café and Lounge, a half dozen cafes across LA County and Highways Performance Space. In New York City, he has shown his work at DTW, PS122, the Danspace Project and

other venues. He toured *Mavericks*, an evening length work for five dancers and community surfers to five sites along the coastal Pacific. Mr. Glassman and his company have been supported by grants, awards and commissions from the Foundation for Contemporary Performance Arts, the Harkness Foundation for Dance, the Puffin Foundation, the Joyce Mertz-Gilmore Foundation, the Tamura Foundation, Dancing In The Streets, the Maine Festival of the Arts, P.S.1 The Institute for Art and Urban Resources, the Manhattan Community Arts Fund. Carmela Hermann is a choreographer who creates dances for the stage, film and site specific venues. Her choreography has been presented throughout the United States and Europe. The Los Angeles Times admired her "confrontational connection between dancing and talking", while proclaiming it to be "full of wild, unpredictable, emotional swings." Hermann has also created several projects in collaboration with other artists including a longtime collaboration with Terrence Luke Johnson and several works with Kristen Smiarowski. Since 1998 she has also collaborated with Simone Forti in creating improvisational duets wherein words and movement intersect. She has taught Simone's approach to dance improvisation "Logomotion" as well as her own "Talking Dances" choreography workshop. Her article "Learning to Speak," about text based dance improvisation was published in the book,"Taken by Surprise" (Wesleyan Press.) In 2000 Carmela founded the Making Dances Workshop, a choreography workshop for dance artists to develop their choreography in a supportive environment with constructive feedback. She has taught at Santa Monica College, the Santa Barbara Dance Festival and ID Fest. She is the recipient of a Durfee grant and was an artist-in-residence at UCLA's 2005 Hothouse Residency Program. She holds an M.F.A. in Choreography and Performance from UCLA's Department of World Arts and Cultures. This will be her second work collaborating with composer Tom Moese.

Leahy earned her M.S. in Dance/movement therapy from Pratt Institute, and is currently practicing d/mt with adults at a psychiatric facility and teaching adult tap classes at Heffington's studio The Sweat Spot. Collaborating with her incredibly talented and dear friends Jasmine Albuquerque and Nina McNeely on their second project, CRONE, Leahy is challenged, inspired, and excited for their future as WIFE. **Jasmine Albuquerque** is a freelance choreographer, dancer and performer.
